

CoMobility - Newsletter 2

November 2021

- The NCBiR monitoring visit took place on 26 November. The National Centre for Research and Development (NCBiR) assessed that the project is being implemented according to plan and appreciated the good cooperation between the project partners.
- Following a series of qualitative interviews with experts in transport, mobility and climate and focus groups with parents from participating primary schools, which concluded in October, analyses of the collected material are underway. The discussions focused on the changes that have taken place in recent years and what more can be done to make transport not only more convenient for residents but also sustainable and climate-friendly. The collected information, opinions and experiences will be used to develop qualitative conclusions and support the construction of a quantitative questionnaire later in the project. - Work is underway to analyse the factors influencing the choice of transport mode when commuting to primary schools in Warsaw. This study will then help us to model the transport choices of Warsaw's residents and, in particular, to simulate the decisions of transport participants when their environment or transport conditions change.
- The first CoMobility Deliverable D.4.1 report by Pal Wilter Skedsmo titled 'Questionnaire Guidelines' was produced.
- We are working intensively on the questionnaire for a quantitative survey, which will be conducted on a representative sample of residents of Warsaw and the surrounding area.
- In November, we continued our educational activities in primary schools – in two of the three schools, the CoMobility team from the 'On-Site' Foundation held another workshop with the pupils. We also invite you to view photos from the October workshop on our website: [link](#).
- The CoMobility team from the Kraków University of Technology observed and measured traffic volumes around the primary schools cooperating in the project.
- A meeting of the Project Steering Group was held on 18 October 2022.
- Dr Anna Nicińska has received funding from the UW Centre for Cooperation and Dialogue to create a film promoting citizen science in the CoMobility project. Work on the script and shooting is already underway.

CoMobility benefits from EUR 2.05 million received from Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway under the EEA funds. The project aims to provide a package of tools and methods to co-create sustainable mobility in urban areas.
